- The perspective of the viewer determines reality



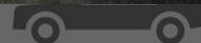
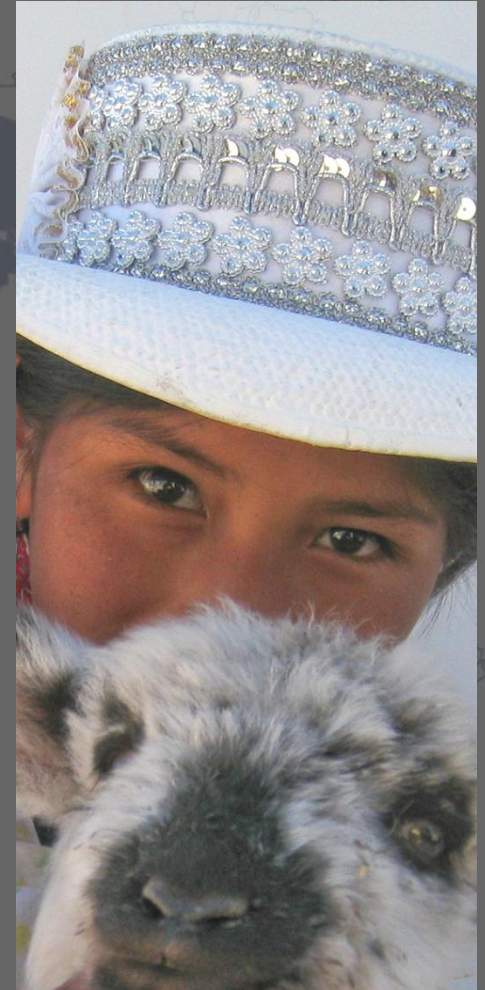
**As your perspective changes,

Reality Gap

- Delta between what you know is reality and what they think is reality
- Very tough to close this gap
- Can be extremely frustrating
- Can lead to major Coming Ashore Effect

When You Return

- Others will not share your perspective
- Others will be a lot less interested than you anticipate
- Some may resent your experiences and observations
- Everyone you know will have moved on

- You may lose friends and family relationships
- You will be different

Return Roles / Plans

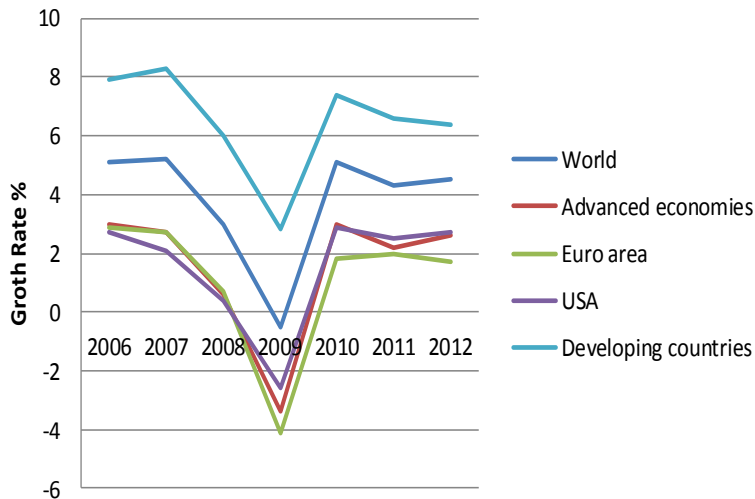
- What, exactly, will you do?

What if you are a different person then?

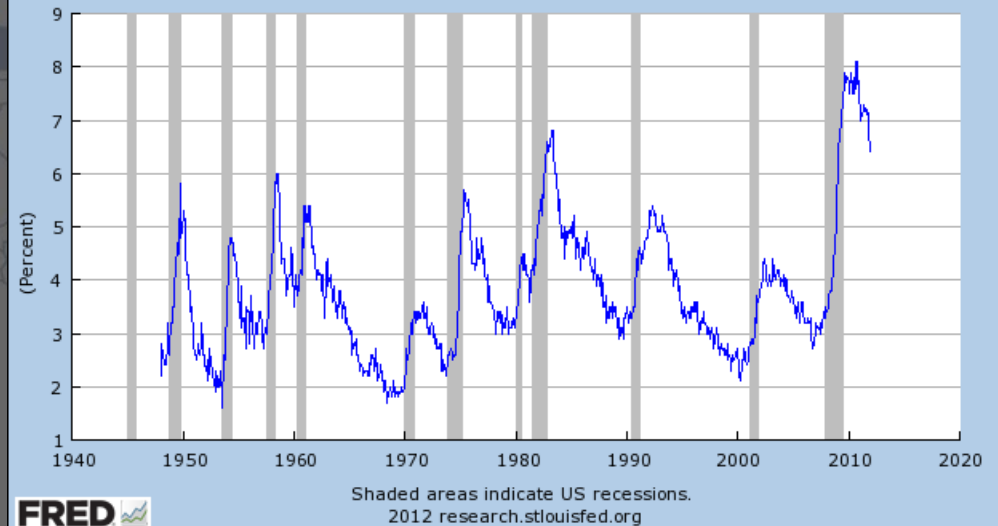


Uncontrollable Variables

Adjusting & Adapting

- Give yourself permission to change
- Give others permission to change
- Be who you are now, not who you were before

Celebrate the changes



Mitigation

- Maintain personal relationships

- Maintain or create new tribal memberships
- Prepare for a new role / reality

Be realistic about reintegration



Pre-Planning

- Event triggers

- Health

- Life events

- Finances

Defined and agreed triggers limit effects



Time Triggers

- Time budget limit
- Sabbatical term
- Seasons
- Ages

Known time bounds can limit effects



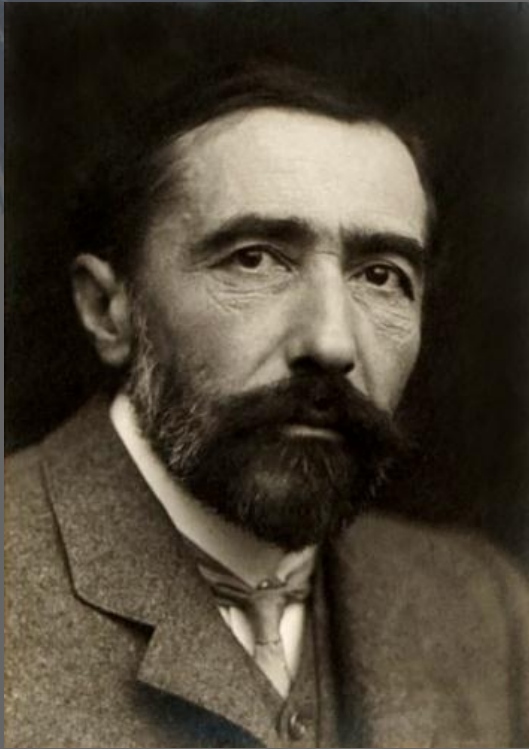
